The fact that "Nile" steamers may be more seaworthy than stern wheelers is recognized but we understand that, possibly owing to lack of adequate preparation for the voyage, a large proportion of the latter have foundered at sea. We suggest that the technical staffs of the companies from which the steamers are impressed be employed by you to strengthen and prepare craft for the voyage and also to provide crews to navigate. Losses in Gulf should be minimized thereby.

After arrival at Basrah you should retain the services permanently, of at least a proportion of the officers, engineers and crew, who have previous experience of this particular kind of craft and this even if wages are higher than Indian Marine rates. This was not done in the case of the "Nile flotilla" so we are informed.



Intelligence. Main Tigris floods from midway between Aziziyah and Kut down to Amarah are now as follows. Suwaicha marsh southern boundary roughly similar to original outline shown on T. C. 18. There is water in horseshoe lake and in narrow lake three miles long E. N. E. of Dahra and running north and south. 

In continuation of my I. G. 2997 of June 9th (Dy. No. 58778). On June 10th Ibn Rashid was interviewed by a special messenger at Safwan, where he has 300 camel sowars and 300 horsemen and not as previously reported a total of 300 in all. He candidly stated that he himself was a Turkish subject and in Turkish pay and consequently not able to correspond in writing. It was in compliance with Turkish orders that he was now so near to us in order to harass us but he had refrained from doing this.

He says that he has no intentions whatever of being unfriendly to us unless Turkish troops arrive in the vicinity of Zubair when he would of course join them, but that until this occurs he considers his caravans are entitled to access to our markets and that he will do what he can to retaliate if this is not permitted.

A letter has been sent to him in answer to the above telling him to move to or beyond Arkhamieh and that if he complies our markets will be open to his caravans to a reasonable extent as long as he permits no unfriendly action towards us. He is also advised in the letter that on the other hand until he reaches Arkhamieh access will not to be given to his caravans and that the sooner he moves there the better or otherwise his fighting men and our cavalry might come into collision. Aircraft reconnaissance over Safwan has verified the strength of his following Addressed Simla; repeated Director, Military Intelligence, London, and Officer in charge Intelligence.

On the night of 14th-15th June our cavalry raided hostile Arab tribe, captured 200 cartloads of grain, number of sheep. Three barges on the Tigris were sunk by Turkish artillery fire 10th June. 
* I saw Dr. Simpson in hospital this morning and he handed over to me the following note:-

"While in Mesopotamia I used a specially constructed theodolite for observing pilot balloons. It was pointed out that similar theodolites had been used in Egypt by the artillery when fixing the position of a target by the aid of aeroplanes. The special construction of these theodolites makes it possible for an aeroplane to be kept in the field of view while manœuvring over the enemy position. Two theodolites are set up at the end of a base line, and the aeroplanes observed through them. As soon as the aeroplane comes over its target it drops a smoke ball, the position of the aeroplane at this moment can be calculated at once from the theodolite observations and so the exact position of the target determined. At the request of Colonel Beach I took my

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theodolite to the Headquarters of Corps Artillery and showed it to General White and Colonel Hardy, who expressed the opinion that this method of fixing targets would be very valuable.

Colonel Beach then asked me if theodolites could be obtained. As they are only used for meteorological work I doubted whether new ones could be bought as they are not stocked by the makers, but I promised to cable England to find if two could be obtained from any of the meteorological observatories. I have drafted the following cable for despatch by the Army Department if approved."

We drew up the following cable together and I suggest that it be sent by the military authorities. On hearing that the instruments are coming Dr. Simpson will send instructions for using them to Colonel Beach:—


With reference to your No. 44745, dated 22nd March, I now submit my reply.

- 2. The extracts from D. O. letter from D. R. I. M. to Surgeon-General MacNeece, forwarded with letter No. 10020-28 (D.M.S.-3), dated 15th May referred to in your telegram No. 54182, dated 15th May, have now reached me.
- 3. In view of these extracts, I would ask whether the allegation contained in your No. 44745 of 22nd March that "river steamers and craft equipped and intended for transport of sick and hospitals have been diverted to other purposes" is still adhered to. If so, I beg leave to point out that the D. R. I. M.'s letter, where it refers to river steamers as distinct from barges, and apart from the absurdly erroneous statement that "there are plenty of big, steamers and barges on the river," nowhere states that steamers have been equipped and intended for transport of sick and hospitals, and sent to Basrah and 'a fortiori' does not state that river steamers so equipped have been diverted to other purposes. So the report which your telegram No. 44745 alleged that the D. M. S. had received to this effect is clearly unfounded in this respect.
- 4. Turning now to the question of barges, D. R. I. M.'s letter says "the eleven composite barges for which I have prepared hospital equipment have been taken by the S. and T. people with the remark that they are too small." I would point out that the D. R. I. M. does not state that these barges had actually been equipped for transport of sick and hospitals,—they had not—but merely that he had "prepared equipment" for them. It is dated some 6 weeks after the first of the barges had arrived at Basrah and a fortnight before the equipment arrived there. As a matter of fact these eleven wooden barges arrived at Basrah without fittings, and, so far as I can ascertain, with nothing

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was asked on January 30th, by you (see your No. 36757) to telegraph whether in other respects grossly ill-informed-see the statement that "any branch of eight of these barges could be made available for hospit al purposes, and whether the service apparently collars steamers or barges to suit their convenience " I concurred in a proposal to send hospital fittings for them.

- 5. In my reply on February 7th, 1135-9 Q. (Dy. No. 37933) I said that wooden barges were thought likely to prove too weak to stand the strain, and at once so that they might be used on barges temporarily employed, until that woodlined steel ones were essential. Finally I advised despatch of fittings specially constructed barges should arrive.
- 6. The fittings did not arrive until the first week in April, and before anything could be done, on April oth, there occurred a serious accident to one of these wooden barges, which clearly showed that our objection to the use of wooden barges was well founded. One wounded man had a narrow escape from being decapitated and the barge was badly stove in.
- 7. It was only then that it was finally decided that these wooden barges should not be fitted up as hospital barges. And my telegram of March 10th. No. 1135-18-Q. (Dy. No. 42989) to which you refer definitely stated that "il Telegram P., No. 304-S., dated 19th June 1916. in face of my expressed opinion on the point of unsuitability of barges in question it is decided they are to be used as hospital barges, they will be made available and fitted up as such as soon as fittings are received."

He summarises these accounts as follows.

Turkish garrison and inhabitants; strength of garrison usually 150 gendarmes but these had just been reinforced by 400 cavalry from Badrah. The contending parties sat behind defences after the first indecisive encounter on the abovementioned date. The Turks occupied the new town and the inhabitants the old town, desultory hostilities were maintained.

Reinforcements up to about 500 were in the meantime reaching the Turks from Baghdad in driblets. The Turks made a sortie on 14th May and attempted to seize the old town, having been flooded out of their defences in the new town, sudden rise of the river.

They used bombs and brought guns to bear. Including 9 British Indians, about 130 inhabitants, men, women and children were killed. The Turks did much damage incidentally by bombarding the sacred minarets and domes The Turks evacuated Karbala fighting a rear guard action as they went, having

lost about 200 and not succeeded in capturing the old town. Ultimately they arrived at Musaiyib or Baghdad, and there are now no Turks in Karbala. The Ulema, on hearing of arrival at Baghdad of Envar Pasha, telegraphed to him on 15th May, asking for amnesty.

Apparently, commission of enquiry was sent down, but result is not known. In addition, a circular letter, signed by 200 of principal inhabitants of Karbala and endorsed by 2 of the Ulema, was brought by the emissary to Cox, to be communicated to the Government of Persia, chiefs of Kashgai and Bakhtiari, and to be promulgated generally in towns of Persia, and asking him to help in (Diary No 61283) getting documents photographed and printed, and the emissary went by a safe route to Persia.

> A description of events is given by the document, and it protests to Islam against a so-called Moslim Government bombarding sacred minarets and domes, mutilating women, and destroying innocent people.

The document has been photographed and printed by Cox and a certain being published by us. This account refers casually to the photographed Begins. 

Leave in proportion to troops sent should be granted to followers who fufil similar conditions. A good effect would in my opinion result from this. With further reference to your telegram of 9th May No. 675-113-A. I recommend strongly that all British officers who have been in Mesopotamia not less than twelve months and who since they started on service have not been invalided from Mesopotamia or granted any leave whether for sickness or wounds be granted 2 months' leave in India during the next 4 months and that to replace them temporarily steps be taken. In India at present there are so many British officers who on account of wounds, etc., have been invalided but who are available for or doing duty in India that surely the British officers now employed in India on extra regimental duty might with advantage be made or (allow)ed to relinquish their appointments and be sent here during the hot weather to do their share. End of telegram from Gorringe.

Paragraph 2.—If feasible the proposal, as an alternative to the exchange of units suggested in my telegram of 12th June, No. 1135-9-O., is worthy of consideration. A lesser movement of troops would be involved and the needs of those chiefly deserving consideration would be catered for.

Paragraph 3.—The military situation at the time will, of course, have to be considered before giving effect to this policy. At present the situation is

Paragraph 4.—It is recommended by me that period of leave be limited to a clear month in India with free passage to and from place where leave is to be taken. Your 61326 of 23rd text of document as follows. To the leaders of the nation and the Chiels of the tribes and Iliatu of the State of Persia. May God perpetuate its Empire. We represent for the information of Your Honour a description of the grievous events of august Kerbela which occurred on the 11th of Rajab 1337 (14th May 1916) trouble you as follows. You must realise that for the inhabitants of Kerbela the afflicted Persians in particular neither life is left nor property fasty reputation honour or credit. After the local Government had given the Ulemas and the Divines of Islam a clear undertaking for six days respite in order to satisfy the remainder of their requirements and claims including the surrender of arms apart from other numerous claims and requirements which the people had already complied with, they on Sunday morning the 11th Rajab trained their guns on the town of Kerbela and by the force of gas pumps gunfire bombs and rifles destroyed a number of houses belonging to the helpless and unprotected people and burned them. Then they invaded the holy courts of the Lord of Martyrs (i.e., Immam Husein) and Abe-Fazlel-Abbas and demolished the facades of the galleries thereof and razed the minarets as well as the clock tower belonging to the Immam and burned them all. Then they stretched their hands towards slaughter and pillage. In one quarter named Babel Khan they piled up the mutilated bodies of destitute old men and helpless women, little children and Seyids and students in a way which moved the heart of the hardest hearted. They mutilated the bodies of the killed, cut off the breasts of women and rent their limbs and members asunder. Then they commenced plundering By the Grace of the Most High. The description of the soulb-urning event of removed all that they could and what they could not take off their sprinkled gas hereof with gas pumps and burned with gun shells and grenades. Their handiwork was such that the history of the world has never seen the like. Even history of the present universal war affords no example in any of the Christian coun-


tries of such savagery as these Ottoman Moslems and brethren in the faith have perpetrated upon a handful of the inhabitants of Kerbela and especially upon the Persian community. A short story of this tragic event together with the photos and distressing illustrations of burnt places and ruined buildings and the pierced and mutilated bodies of men, women and children have been submitted to you separately. But in the hope of prompt redress and instantaneous immunity our special request from Your Honour is that you should by the first opportunity take such measures as God would approve to help the survivors of us helpless Moslems because we consider the persons of Your Honours as official representative of the Government and the nation and that you should by any medium that you think fit take immediate and energetic steps by telegraphic communications to communicate the description of this painful event to the just court of the Ottoms Government and in the meantime you should obtain immunity in the present and instructions for the future so that perhaps by God's Grace and the blessings of the Imains and the energetic steps of Your Honours this handful of Moslems may get relief and our vexed hearts may in some measure be considered and all Moslems may enjoy a little immunity so that with easy minds they may be take to praying for the endurance of the august Moslem Governments and of the lives of Your Honour. Undoubtedly the historical kudos to be earned by the taking of such measure which will please God will be the best possible reason for your lasting good name and the honourable mention of your goodselves in history. By the Grace of the Most High. All that is written herein by the leading tradesmen for the information of the national leaders constitutes only one tenth of the soul-burning events which occurred in the holy places. Now the inhabitants of this sacred place generally and the Ulemas and Divines of Islam particularly rely on these leaders who God willing should take up the question of the preservation of the lives of the remainder of the poor and helpless people. Kerbela is far worse than what the respected merchants have written in detail and it is certainly by all means incumbent and necessary on every zealous and brave man to do his utmost and strive hard in order to preserve the remount of those living here and the followers of Amitulmoamanin and to improve their circumstances

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

- 2. It is found that a large bar has been formed at the junction of the Tigris and Chahala at Amarah since the date of Willcock's surveys, and at present this is an effectual safeguard against the Tigris diverting down the and dredging work on Hammar Lake is in progress. Chahala.
- 3. Buchanan considers therefore that the construction of a weir across the Chahala is unnecessary, but that some day a permanent barrage with lock for passage of boats and regulators will have to be built.
- 4. Although of not sufficient importance to necessitate building of an emergency weir this year, a modified form of barrage will be necessary across the Majar Kabir canal.
- 5. Buchanan proposes to build a weir across the Machiriyah canal as soon as possible, as it is found that nearly half of the entire flow of the Tigris above Oalat Saleh passes down the canal.
- 6. Buchanan discovered, during his investigations of the narrows between Qalat Saleh and Ezra's tombs, that considerable damage to navigation was being caused by Arab cultivators throwing out brushwood groynes and reclaiming land on a falling flood. Doubtless this practice has been going on for years, and the constant deterioration of the river is probably largely due to it. All reclamation work and groynes of this sort are being destroyed.
- 7. Further damage has been done by the Arab custom of cutting irrigation ditches at concave river bends; this not only impedes navigation by dragging

APPENDIX 413 craft into these channels, but also results in time in accentuating the sharpness (Diary No. 62127) of these bends. All these irrigation channels will be closed.
