### حول هذا السجل

تقرير عن جزيرة قيس أو كين [كيش] قام بكتابته جون ماكنيل من معلومات تم جمعها من سكان الجزيرة  
والساحل الفارسي المجاور [الإيراني]، غير مؤرخ. يبحث التقرير في العلاقات بين الموانئ  
الفارسية المجاورة، ولا سيما بندر جارك، مع القواسم والوهابيين، والحكومة الفارسية في شيراز،  
ومسقط. ويحتوي على جداول تعرض قوات كل من لنجة وبندر مغوه وبندر جارك وقلات وطاحونة [بندر  
طاحونة] والمناطق التابعة لها من الرجال والقوارب، وأسماء الشيوخ الحاكمين.

Statement of information collected on the Island of Suco, or Sowa, from the Natives of that Island, and from some Inhabitants of the opposite Coast.

It appears that the crews of Singa, Magoe, Chavacki, Sainak, and Kelaht, have all been on terms of intimacy with the Seamen of the Coast of Arabia - but they have not any of them committed acts of Plunder with their own vessels.

They were employed in commerce and conveyed from the different parts of the Gulf, provisions and Shoes, which the Seamen could not themselves procure, and which the people of the Persian Side found their account in selling to them.

The better to cover the nature of this traffic it was not unusual with them to make a show of being at War with the Wahabees, and this expedient has

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has been resorted to particularly by the  
Sheikh of Charraek; though the connection  
of that Chief with the Wahabees seems  
to have been entirely commercial on  
his part.

It is said that about four  
years ago a Peasnee force appeared on  
this Coast, that some negotiations were  
carried on, between that Tribe, and the  
Sheikh, and that one result of this was  
the reception of a Wahabee Agent at  
Charraek. — This was to be made ac-  
quainted with the departure, and des-  
tination of every vessel leaving that  
Port.

It seems however that the  
Sheikh was jealous of this interference  
and endeavoured to improve his rela-  
tions with the Court of Shiraz and  
Muscat. — His Troops accompanied  
those of the Prince of Shiraz, in an  
Expedition against Nagoo about a  
year

year ago, and assisted in the attack on  
that place, which had become obnoxious  
in consequence of the Inhabitants having  
become Wahahees.

He sent about nearly at  
the same time to Muscat, which on its  
return thence was plundered and taken  
by the Wahahees, since which time the  
people of Charrack have been a practical  
War with the Seasmens.

The only act of plunder  
of which the Charrack people are accused  
is their having taken possession of a  
Bessel from Bushire, which was  
wrecked on the Island of Suez, and  
which had on Board a quantity of  
Treasure, and some Hindu besides the  
property.

The Shik returned 29 of  
the 32 Bags of treasure, which were on  
board, and all the Horses and Mares  
accepting

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excepting, four or five, to a Mr Henshaw  
who came from Bushia to recover  
the property. — The matter was com-  
promised by the intervention of Sheikh  
Kufelan of Bunder, Assala, who accom-  
panied Mr Henshaw to Charvack,  
and who threatened the Sheikh, with  
an attack, in the event of his not coming  
to an arrangement.

This act however of  
Abdulla ben Ahmed is essentially  
different from the depredations of the  
Joasmee, as it was not a forcible attack,  
and could not have been the effect of  
any previous arrangement, or depredation.

These Puts on the Persian  
Side seem all of them to have been  
connected with the Joasmee for  
their own security, and for the sake  
of the advantages derived from the  
Trade with them — not for the pur-  
pose of Plunder — They were not  
protected

protected against the Wahabees by their own Government and were not strong enough to protect themselves. I have announced therefore only the alternative of giving up Trade altogether, or of being on terms with the Wahabees.

Subjoin a statement of the Forces in armed men, and boats of a size fitted for Piracy belonging to each of the places which I have enumerated. A considerable portion however of the armed population is unaccustomed to maritime occupations as they live inland.

These Towns, and their Dependences occupy the whole of the part of the Coast of Persia which has been connected with the Wahabees on terms of intimacy.

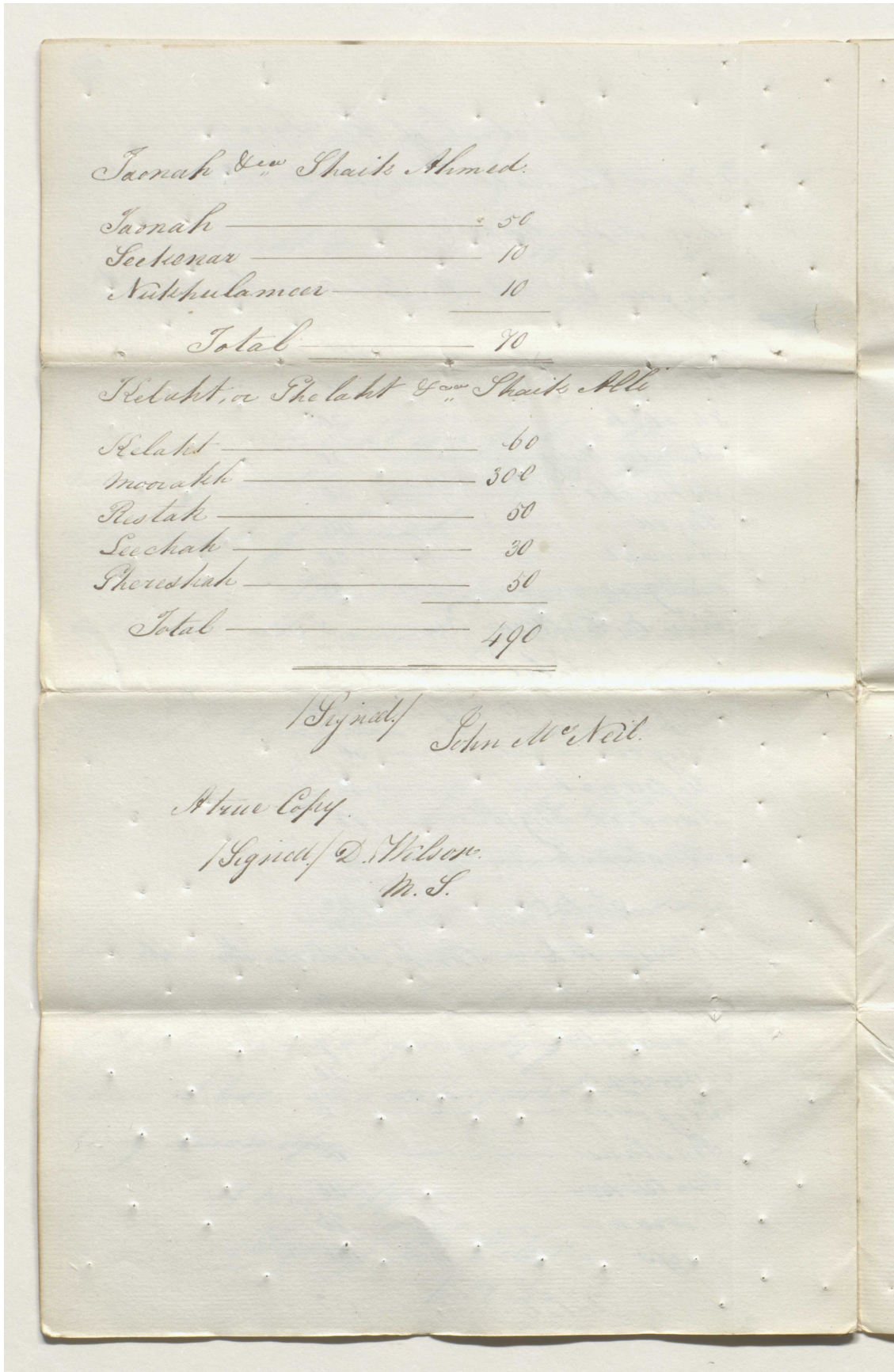

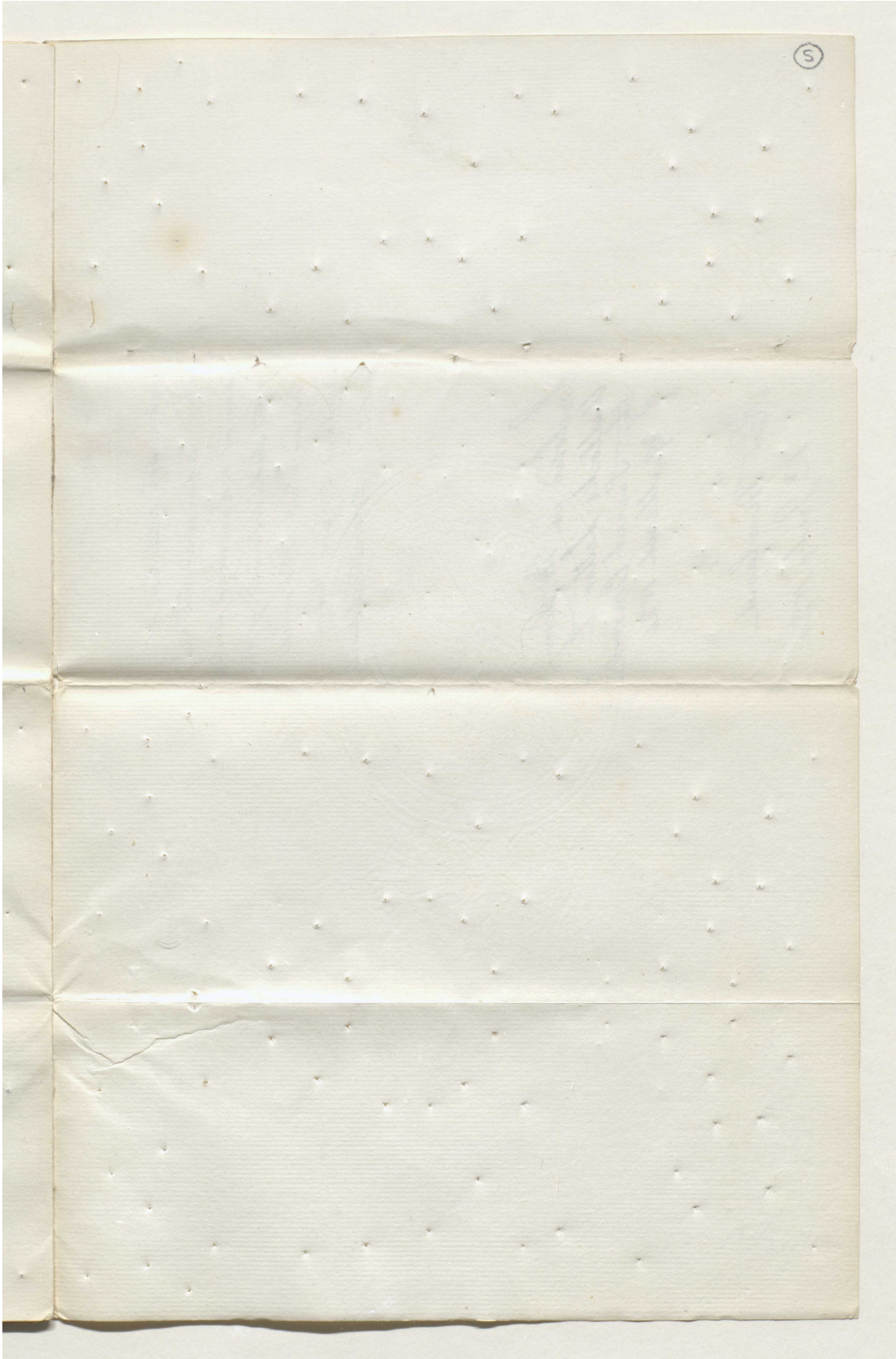
